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## CHAVARA A TRUE MORALIST

Oxford advanced learner's dictionary defines the term moralist as a person who has strong ideas about moral principles, especially one who tries to tell other people how they should behave or a person who teaches or writes about moral principles. St. Chavara was a true moralist who wrote on the common moral norms that every Christian family should keep. Before one hundred and fifty-two years ago he wrote these things in a very significant letter in which he addressed his own home parish community at Chennangari.

In the preface to this letter he says, 'a disorder family will cause much more sorrows and tears'. Even though this letter was written to a particular Christian community it doesn't mean that it is not for all Christians and in the same way since it was written to a Christian community it does not exclude other religious groups from it.

He had such strong moral fiber to build a new and morally reformed community. For, St. Chavara had strong conviction that the building up of the society should begin from the family and also from the individuals. From this insight he wrote these things to the families where a person is being molded of. In this letter which is being considered as his death sentence he is giving the moral tips to different realms of life such as precepts for families, love, humility, relatives and friends, industriousness, act of charity, desire for justice, fear of god, patience, good books, days of obligation, daily routine and upbringing of the children.

St. Chavara wrote this by realizing the social situations and the minds of the people of his time. It is true that man is being evolved every now and then. But the moral norms that St. Chavara put forward even before one hundred and fifty two years ago is very important even in today's context. Mar George Cardinal suggested this as the Magna Carta for the families. Let this moral norms inspire us to lead a moral life and to become a good examples of morality in our society.

In Familiaris Consortio, St. John Paul II refers to family as the most important and fundamental unit of the Church and society, at large. St. Chavara, a century back, defined a good Christian family as the image of Heaven on earth where members live together by the bond of blood and affection, duly respecting and obeying parents, living peacefully before God and people, seeking eternal salvation according to each one's proper state of life. This definition comprises all the aspects of a Christian family. He instructs that both blood and affection is important to bond the members of a family. Absence of blood relation is as dangerous as absence of affection in a family especially in this scientific era. St. Chavara's visionary outlook about the ideal Christian family is remarkable in today's context.

St. Chavara considers that the intimacy and love among family members is an imperative that de-

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termines the potency of the family. He advises that "the blessing and honour of a family consists in its peaceful existence without quarrel ... any litigation ruins the family" and "the most valuable possession of a family consists in fear of and devotion to the Lord. A family in which the fear of the Lord pervades will enjoy the fruit of divine blessings in this world as well as in eternity." In today's fast paced world where success is equated to "having more" than in "being more", it is very common to see unethical work and financial practices, extravagant spending, pride and imbalance use of wealth and power. Many families have been victims of this epidemic of greed which is sustained by an attitude of "possessing something" than "being someone".
